20/20 **VISION**

Can you believe it is 2020?

One picture I carry from childhood is of my grade school teacher talking about the turn of the century and how we would all live to see the next century. We were assigned to write an essay on what we saw ourselves doing New Year's Eve on 12/31/1999. I saw myself as so old in 1999 that I could not envision myself being able to do anything, just living in a nursing home, eating milk toast. Ok, my ability to see the future was not 20/20. And, her vision of us all living to see the turn of the century did not happen either. It turned out that the image of WWI being the war to end all wars, and the perception of WWII being the last great conflict were not accurate, several classmates did not come back from Viet Nam.

Then December 1999 came, we had been married for less than a year, and I was in management at a high tech company where we employed lots of highly educated people who frantically worked on fixing the Y2K bug. The generally envisaged concept was that all the computers were going to crash at the stroke of midnight on December 31, 1999. Friends had a 20 years supply of dry food in their basement because they had Ph.D.'s in computer science and could foretell a crisis coming. (Note to self, call friends to find out if they have eaten all those dried beans.) I stayed up to watch TV, not to see the ball drop but to see if mayhem occurred as the computers' internal clocks clicked to 12:01 AM 1/1/2000. First to register the click to the new century was Christmas Island, then New Zealand, Australia, Japan, and Singapore.

Here is trivia for you, it takes 26 hours for the time to change around the world. And, no, I did not even stay up until the ball dropped in NYC. I figured if I had not witnessed the total collapse of the computer systems in the first several countries to enter the new century, we were safe here in the good old USA.

Now it is 20 years later. Yes, we've watched two decades pass in front of our eyes since the turn of the century. Yes, it is 2020, but is our vision any closer to 20/20?

The first turn we decode at CR is overcoming our denial. That is looking at ourselves with 20/20 vision; mistakes, hurts, hangups, harmful habits ... or as the saying goes ... warts and all. Denial is viewed as the primary roadblock to change, to recovery, to healthy living. Refusing to concede that something is wrong is an unhealthy way of coping with stress, conflict, painful thoughts, threatening information, fear, or anxiety. We can be in denial about many things. We can be in denial about events that make us vulnerable, actions that threaten, feelings that we are losing control, or struggles. Struggles include shame, addictions, eating disorder, grief, financial problems, co-dependency, depression, anxiety, body image, or relationship conflicts.

The good news, help to get the right prescription for 20/20 vision is available. Hope to see you Tuesday nights at 6:45 in Legacy Hall, where we take off our masks, put on our glasses and face our problems with God's help.



Moving is stressful for anyone but to become a homeowner after a life of living in a church-supported parsonage presents new challenges and responsibilities for them. Pray that we as their church family will know what we can do to help them with this transition. Going our Separate Ways



In our book Are We Really Better Together?, Walter Fenton and I spent little time debating whether we United Methodists are better together.

Instead, we provided abundant evidence that progressives, centrists, and traditionalists are not together when it comes to our understanding of the Bible and its inspiration, our sexual ethics, or what it means to be in mission to the world.

Our book was part of a series of volumes commissioned by Abingdon Press. Others in the series contended that we needed to remain at the table and create a way forward together. No one is arguing for that any longer. Our thesis that United Methodists are not together has become the general consensus of the church. It took the most harmful General Conference the UM Church has ever experienced to make our irreconcilable differences clear to everyone. But now centrist leaders, church bureaucrats, and bishops are finally acknowledging what we have declared for decades - remaining at the table, listening to each other's story one more time, and pretending that our differences are just minor disagreements about relatively unimportant matters, cannot heal our divide.

The question the church must now answer is "How can we best part

company?" Our solution, supported by all the evangelical renewal movements within The United Methodist Church, is a respectful, negotiated settlement that creates two or three new denominations, each receiving its fair share of the assets of what is presently The United Methodist Church. Our main concern when it comes to the division of assets is that the church where it is the poorest and the fastest-growing (primarily Africa and Asia) be fully funded to continue its good work for Christ and his kingdom. Evangelicals receiving all we are entitled to is of lesser importance.

Unfortunately, many of those who so long denied the reality of our division, are now putting forth a solution that is neither fair nor amicable. Their proposal is that traditionalists leave the denomination. We can keep our buildings, after making certain financial payments, but the assets of the UM Church would remain with those who remain. And there are no guarantees that the church in Africa and Asia will be fully funded as we believe they should be.

The truth is that for decades we have been in touch with the reality that we are not together and have believed the best way forward is a respectful, negotiated parting of the ways. We will continue to work for this solution as we prepare for General Conference 2020. Please support us with your prayers and with your financial giving. Both are essential for our work and for the good of the church.

Over the last 20 years, I have witnessed friends and colleagues in other mainline denominations struggling with principled disagreements over the definition of marriage and the role of LG-BTQ persons in the church. Will United Methodists deal with our differences in a Christ-like manner?

At General Conference 2020 we can arrive at a fair plan of separation that allows annual conferences and local churches to choose their ministry direction. It is time for the delegates to General Conference to acknowledge that separation is necessary, as well as beneficial for the church through the multiplication of different forms of United Methodist ministry. We need to let one another go in as fair and loving a way as possible. The United Methodist Church has the opportunity to show the world that we can resolve our conflict in a peaceful way, in the spirit of Jesus Christ. We can learn from the mistakes of those who have faced these issues before us and be the first denomination to take a different approach. After all, the world is watching.


